

A theater is a building or area for dramatic performances displayed on a stage





## PARTS OF A STAGE



- A ACTOR: a person who acts, especially in a play or movie or on television
- B PROSCENIUM: the wall containing the arch that frames the stage
- C CURTAIN: the movable screen separating the stage from the auditorium
- D STAGE: a raised platform that features the actors

# WHAT IS A PLAY?

A play is a piece of writing (literature) which can be seen at a theater. Plays often show conversations between people. A play is usually watched, rather than being read.



## WHO IS INVOLVED?

Plays and theatrical performances require many people to bring these stories to life!



#### DIRECTOR

A person who supervises the production of a show and gives instruction to the actors on stage



#### COSTUME DESIGNER

A person who creates the characters' outfits



#### STAGE MANAGER

A person who assists the director during rehearsals & is in charge of the stage during a performance



#### SET DESIGNER

A person who creates the scenery on stage






# DESTIGNACTIVE TO




## PUT ON A SHOW!

Divide students into groups of 5-7 and have them choose a scene from Stuart Little to recreate. In these groups there will be a costume designer, a director, a stage manager, and the rest will be performers. All together they will rewrite the scene. This activity utilizes the talents of students who like to perform and the students who like the help out behind the scenes. When all the groups are done with their individual assignments put the scenes together and have the students perform for the class.

## MADE BEBOOK SPEECH

Print out the provided Mad Libs from the end of the PowerPoint and fill them out as a class. The instructor is the only one allowed to see what the Mad Libs say and is the only one who can write down the answers on the sheet. Once all of the Mad Libs have been completely filled out, choose volunteers who would like to recite and dramatically read the Mad Libs in front of the class. To make the activity more fun, have the students suggest different kinds of emotions and characters for the performing student to portray while reading the Mad Lib.



#### "SAVE THE RING!" MEASURING ACTIVITY


For this activity, have students go into groups and create drain pipes of various sizes and angles using empty paper towel rolls and tape. Student groups will trade drain pipes once completed. With the new drain pipes, students will measure the length of the drain pipe. For the second part of the activity, students will use that measurement they just took to create a hook using pipe cleaners. The goal is to be able to retrieve Mrs. Little's ring at the bottom of the drain. A fun reward for getting the ring from the bottom of the drain is providing Ring Pops.

Have students use an empty tissue box or an empty paper towel to design a race car. They can use any kind of materials they would like.





Then cut four holes on the sides of the "race car" large enough to put straw or wooden dowels through. Make sure there is enough space for the straws or dowels to be able to roll. After this, place the straws or dowels through the holes. You should only need two. For wheels, use card board circles or old CDs/DVDs taped to the straws.




Tape a straw to the inside of a balloon. This will act as our engine. Tape this straw to the top back of the race car.



To have the cars race, use the straw balloon engine to blow into the balloon. Have the students cover the engine straw hole with their thumb until the cars need to race.

#### EMOTION GUESSING GAME

Print out images of Stuart Little and students draw on his face to create different emotions. Then have the students or help the students cut out the Stuart's head and glue it on a paper plate. Measure a long strip around the students head and then attach that paper to the plate. Have one student at a time present to the rest of the class their mask and the other students can guess the emotion. Have an open discussion on how certain facial expressions could be misinterpreted as other emotions.
