

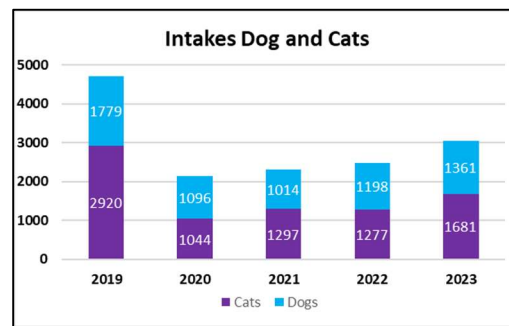
## Rancho Cucamonga Animal Center 2023 Statistics

### Introduction

2023 was a challenging year, both in terms of increased animal intake and finding suitable homes for the animals entering the Animal Center. The most vulnerable populations included large adolescent dogs with behavior concerns, moms with puppies, and neonatal kittens. The Animal Center works with many rescue groups to assist with finding placement. However, rescue partners also reported the same challenges and had decreased availability to take the number of vulnerable animals needing assistance in Rancho Cucamonga and State-wide.

### Animal Intake

In 2023, the Animal Center took in 404 more cats and 163 more dogs compared to 2022. Below is a 5 year comparison.

The Rancho Cucamonga Animal Center is funded by the City of Rancho Cucamonga's general fund. It accepts and cares for animals that were found within the city. The best chance for any animal to be reunited with its owner or to find a new home is when the animal is taken to the shelter that services the city it was found in. In 2023, 41% of dogs and cats were brought in by non-residents who stated they found the pet in Rancho Cucamonga. Since the number of animals received from non-residents is significant, future policy changes may be warranted.
